Sandy Point Community Group: What we do

The primary role of the Sandy Point Community Group (SPCG) is to provide strong advocacy in support of improved facilities, infrastructure and recreational facilities within the local community.

Over the years, we have responded to key Council initiatives, and advocated for relevant community issues, such as improved phone and internet connections, better toilet facilities, traffic calming measures, caravan park issues, bore set back issues and responding to members' requests to address identified hazard areas.

This coming year we will advocate for the development of a Town Centre Plan by the Shire which might include commercial centre revitalisation, environmental initiatives, tourism initiatives etc. The Waratah Way Shared Trail and the installation of a skate park are still priority projects and toilets at Ned Neale's are one of several on the wish list

Financial support for local groups through assistance with grant applications and donations to their specific projects is also a role of SPCG. We can act as the facilitator to apply for grants on behalf of other Sandy Point community groups and have several sub groups operating under the auspice of SPCG, such as Sandy Point Music, WiSP (Wildlife in Sandy Point), the Community Garden group and Signage group.

SPCG also conducts community strengthening events, such as the Sandcastle Competitions that are held on the surf beach each year, generally one at Easter and one during the Christmas holidays (usually between Christmas and New Year). Each year in early January we also hold our increasingly popular Foodies and Artisans Market which showcases a range of local food, drinks and artisan products.

What we have achieved

Donations we've made to other groups have included:

- TP Taylor Committee of Management for solar panels on the Community Centre, payment for additional power outlets and a donation towards purchase of new photocopier/printer
- Sandy Point Music for the purchase of a stage and lighting
- Donation to the Sarsfield Community Group Bush Fire Appeal
- Sandy Point Community Power Inc for setting up costs
- Marine Rescue Service for a water rescue training dummy
- Foreshore committee for installation of bench seat on boardwalk
- Donation towards the printing and installation of the new information signs on the reserve opposite the shops
- Sandy Point Koala project for training of wildlife rescue personnel
- Bass Coast Wildlife Shelter

Advocacy has included:

- the installation of new toilet block and landscaping of surrounding areas
- Telstra for installation of new tower (further advocacy for improvements, ongoing)
- SGSC review of caravan park
- SGSC, EPA, DWELP, Government consultation re bore set back requirements
- Road surfacing
- Road hazards and traffic calming measures
- Dogs on beach
- Replacement of the Big Yellow Slide at playpark

Funded projects include:

- Provision of a beach wheelchair for free community use
- Community Garden wicking beds
- A smart cabinet to house a 24 hour access defibrillator unit

Our wheelchair is for use not only by those people living with a disability but also those people, often elderly, who just find it too hard to walk over the soft sand to the beach. Its large balloon tyres allow people like this to experience the joys of a trip to the Sandy Point beach once more. It can easily be pushed along the beach near the water's edge and also allows its users to participate in family activities and events such as weddings on the beach.

The wheelchair is available for loan free of charge for any period from one hour to half a day, for use on the Sandy Point main beach. It is easily handled by two able bodied carers. It is not designed for use in the water but can be taken right down to the water's edge.

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Proof of double COVID vaccination required for indoor events



We're back! Many months have passed since Sandy Point hosted an evening of music. So excitement was almost tangible on Saturday night. Folk singer Khristian Mizzi was the first cab off the block to entertain us.

Most of us would have been happy to see anything, more or less, as long as it was live music. But what an unexpected treat was in store.

His voice has been – accurately – described as 'strong and gentle'. Influenced by classic singer-songwriters Cat Stevens, Leonard Cohen and Neil Young, Khristian nonetheless stamped his own identity on each song. He specializes in short stories, the beauty in the everyday, soulful insights into family life and the innocence of childhood. His acoustic guitar playing was precise, smooth and effortlessly melodic, occasionally punctuated by his harmonica.

The evening was sprinkled with cover versions. There were classic renditions of 'Heart of Gold' and 'Human Highway' from Neil Young (Khristian also fronts a Neil Young cover band), the Mamas and the Papas' 'California Dreaming', Cat Stevens 'Moonshadow' but also some more obscure choices such as a brilliant interpretation of Don McLean's early song 'Castles in the Air'.

But Khristian's own songs by no means suffered by comparison. In a world where artists can be catapulted to global fame as a teenager, it seems a crying shame that his songs have accumulated relatively little attention to date. But, it did mean we were able to enjoy an evening in the company of this warm and self-deprecating artist in an intimate setting.

Khristian was joined on stage by radio veteran, singer, song writer Greg Champion for a few numbers and the duo harmonized to great effect.

The evening kicked off with Meg Doherty who delivered a beautiful acoustic set.

As we all helped stack the tables and chairs at the end of a magical evening, we were all reminded of what we'd been missing out on all this time. Thank you to Khristian, Meg and Greg for a very special night.

Chairperson's Report

On Friday 10th December the committee organised the "Sandy Point Reconnecting" event on the grass at the Centre and what a great success it was, with over 120 people getting reacquainted with other residents. Thanks to the South Gippsland Shire Council COVID recovery grants allowing for the event to be fully funded and free to all who attended. The tasting platter from Trulli's of Meeniyan plus the sausages from Jenkins butchers of Foster were enjoyed by everyone along with the refreshments from Sandy Point General Store.

The installation of the Community Centre Solar Battery Storage system is well under way and the Sandy Point Community Power team are hoping to have it "up and running" early in the new year. South Gippsland Council has been successful with a grant to cover the cost installing a satellite dish to ensure NBN connection even when power is lost, which will be backed up by solar battery. This is vital to the community as Sandy Point Community Centre is a designated "Place of Last Resort".

The Trivia night in January has been cancelled again, as preparation for this night starts months before and given the uncertainty of what could and could not be done in January it was decided by the Committee that the wellbeing of the volunteers, committee members, patrons and the public was most important. Once again Kidz Klub will not be running their program down here in Sandy Point in 2022.

Wishing everyone a very Merry Christmas and let's hope that things return to some sort of normal in 2022.

Wildlife welfare

We had six successful releases in 2021. The highlight of these was the release of Baby Alice on 10 November, an article about which was included in the Foster Mirror on 24 November. Baby Alice is the first successful treatment of chlamydia in koalas from Sandy Point by Jenny Scheppers (only the second case reported here).

Our total number of animal call outs in 2021 was 15 (13 koalas, a microbat and a ringtail possum). Unfortunately 7 koalas were either already dead or later died (5 of these from mange). Neither the microbat nor the possum survived.

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The Sandy Point Foreshore Committee of Management: its role and funding

When we were asked to provide an article for the newsletter, we thought it was a great opportunity to enlighten all the new visitors to our area as to what we do and also provide an update to all the locals and visitors who have enjoyed our area for many years.

The Committee manages in the order of 600ha of Crown Land reserve, covering from around 1.5Km west of Ned Neal's and east to the Shallow Inlet ocean entrance and both sides of the Shallow Inlet road from the outskirts of the Sandy Point Township.

We have 2 types of funding:

- 1. Grants, if we are successful in winning them, mainly from DELWP, that are used for specific projects such as the new main beach viewing platform and the erosion fencing on the beach. We have also endeavoured to obtain funding for weed control but have not been all that successful.
- **2. Parking fees** generated at Shallow Inlet over the summer period and for yearly parking fees. This pays for our rangers to clean and trim all the tracks, undertake rubbish removal and collect the fees. This generates around \$3,500 net a year, so is not a huge revenue base.

From the parking fees we have to undertake the following tasks:

- Gravel and grading the section of road from the bitumen to Shallow Inlet entrance undertaken twice yearly (this is not Council land)
- Gravel and grading the high level (HL) carpark at Shallow Inlet undertaken once yearly
- Pruning the traffic island at the entrance road near the HL carpark entrance
- Maintenance of the toilet block area by:
 - Mowing and brush cutting, 4-5 times yearly
 - Maintaining water supply and cisterns
 - Repairs to picnic tables
 - Gas supply and repairs and maintenance to the gas BBQs
- Maintaining signage at Shallow Inlet
- Removal of rubbish at Shallow Inlet area
- Maintaining safe access for vehicles at Shallow Inlet
- Pruning and brush cutting:
 - The track from HL carpark to shallow inlet toilet block and the boat launching area
 - The Roy Henderson track 2.1 km long and 2.4m wide

- Other tracks from township to beach: the Horse track, Manuka Sth, Manuka, Ennisvale, Park Ave and 2nd Avenue and main beach access road
- Maintaining main beach track including:
 - grading of main beach access road annually
 - drainage at main beach access road including grated drains and open drainage paths
 - beach erosion fencing
 - · access to main beach sand walkway
 - maintenance and repairs to main beach shower
 - maintenance of main beach timber walkway handrails and fencing
 - maintenance main beach viewing platform
- Maintenance of Ned Neal's beach access area by:
 - gravel and grading of access road and car parking area annually (this is not Council Land)
 - pruning and mowing etc of access road and carpark areas
 - maintenance of Ned Neal's viewing platform, the timber walkway, handrails, stairs and fencing
- General maintenance of signage including main access track signage.
- · Removal of rubbish and goods such as couches and similar items deposited in sand dunes. No funding for disposal
- Removal/hindering/elimination of newly established tracks through dunes
- Purchasing of Doggy bags (Approx \$750 per year)

So as you can see we have lots to undertake and fortunately we have some great volunteers and our paid Rangers that undertake a lot of the general works.

However some of the very important tasks are getting a lot more costly to undertake so we are always looking for new and supported funding from the Government agency DELWP we represent.

I hope the above gives some insight to our role in managing this wonderful place and of course if you the public can assist us please do not hesitate to get in touch at sandypointforeshore@gmail.com

Even small things such as bringing your own doggy bags and taking rubbish home with you helps heaps.

Just a reminder also it is the time of year that dogs are restricted in accessing our beach to specified times and please resist the inclination to leave recycled goods such as couches etc on the nature strips as they more than often end up in the sand dunes.

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Sandy Point Community Power: an update

We are pleased to report that the Community Centre Battery project is nearing completion. The enclosure is now complete thanks to the great help in its construction from the Sandy Point Men's Shed. There have been some delays in sourcing some components but these have been recently landed and it is hoped to have the equipment in and running early in the New Year. The 30kW of storage will help to maintain essential services at the centre in the event of grid power disruptions.

Unfortunately, our e-trading scheme has not yet progressed to the anticipated trial phase. We have been working through a number of last minute contractual issues in order to get a scheme appropriate for community participation. Also, recent changes in the electricity market, with substantial wholesale price drops, have increased the availability of alternative retailer competition and as such reduced the attractiveness of our proposed rates rates offer. We are still negotiating.



You may recall that we were invited to partner with an energy company in an application for the Victorian State Government's Energy Innovation Fund that, if successful, would potentially see the establishment of a Virtual Power Plant (VPP) here at Sandy Point. The project would, if funded, see a mix of renewable energy generation and storage at residential, commercial, and community buildings at a scale required for energy self-sufficiency. We are still awaiting the results of our application.

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Signage projects update

The Sandy Point Signage Group is a sub-committee of the Sandy Point Community Group and over the last two years the group has been working on a project to update the signage around Sandy Point.

The project has been split into three stages: a set of information signs to go on the reserve opposite the shops, a new welcome sign on Telopea Drive and revitalising the four decorative surfboards near the shops.

Information Signs

We're nearly there. These have now been designed and printed and we hope will be in the ground for the Christmas period, though minus the concrete slab, which is a requirement by Council to ensure that the area can be accessed for mowing. This will be added soon after the installation. There are 3 large signs plus an additional copy of the Koala sign:

- Sandy Point's Amazing Wildlife
- Where the Sand meets the Sea

Plans have been submitted to Council for approval as the sign is on a roadside reserve.

Council has approved the draft plans so the next stage will be to source grants for the project to ensure all costs are covered. We'll keep you informed of the progress on this.

The CFA Water Tank in the car park opposite the Centre is currently in need of some beautification but this tank is the responsibility of the Community Centre, CFA and South Gippsland Shire Council and so does not form part of this project. Discussions about what would be the best option for this project are being considered.



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Waratah Marine Search and Rescue (MSAR): annual report

This year was a continuation of the last with respect to disruption to service, travel restrictions and increased safety at the base and on board the recue vessel. COVID 19 changed the way we operate, interact, and respond. Where previously we could take the full allocation of 6 on board, we are currently restricted to 3.

We also had the opportunity this year to include an 8.5m NIAID rescue vessel in our flotilla, but due to logistics and after a fit for purpose review of the vessel, we declined. Suffice to say the Andrew Cope stays as our primary rescue vessel. But good news is that we upgraded the GPS and essential equipment on the vessel and are slated to install new outboards, replacing the 15-year-old Yamahas that have done us good service.

We also recently launched our base and placed a commemorative plaque to honour Rob O'Brien and name the base the Rob O'Brien Marine Search and Rescue Base.

Finally, with the introduction of a Charter and Committee of

Management, Waratah Marine Rescue has put structure into the day-to-day operations and function of our unit. Where previously we managed training and events in an ad hoc fashion, we now have schedules and plans – which now we are out of lockdown, we can implement.

Training

Our training has been enhanced by a dedicated training team, headed by Mike Devine and supported by Greg Moulding, Doug Taylor and Ray Henderson.

Also, exciting news in the training world is the near completion of Sinkalot, a training vessel specifically designed to sink. Sinkalot is a hull that was gifted to the service after being rescued. It has gone through major modifications to allow it to be partially sunk after launching, so crew members can practice and train on real life equipment. Sinkalot was funded in part by the Victorian Government and by the Bendigo Bank.



MSAR Member of the Year

As a result of changes to training and the effort to improve our records, Mike Devine was named the WMR member of the year. Well done Mike on a fantastic job!

Active Duty

Our last season saw 5 official callouts with 1 stand down, one request for support, and one unusual "rescue" (travelling with the Walkerville Walruses as they swam 5 km from Walkie to Waratah). Low numbers were probably due to being in lockdown for a substantial part of the year. The tasks were both within Shallow Inlet and around the islands off Wilsons Prom.



Planning, operations and management

The past season has seen the use of different aspects of IT to assist with planning, operations and management.

WhatsApp is now used as a platform to provide frequent two-way communication. Members are notified of events, issues, and upcoming training activities and can quickly respond and advise of availability for training or provide other contributions.

The Andrew Cope

The Andrew Cope is a 15 year old 6m Zodiac Rigid Hull Inflatable Boat – RHIB. It has a new GPS which is a Furuno NavNet, current equipment for all rescue vessels. It will allow us to interact with the Rescue Coordination Centre and receive data and tracks when a search pattern is prescribed.

The automatic identification system, or AIS was recently installed, and is used to transmit a ship's position so that other ships are aware of its position.

This year we were also fortunate enough to secure our own tow vehicle. The vehicle chosen was a new Isuzu D-MAX supplied by Leongatha Isuzu. During negotiations, we also managed to secure sponsorship from the dealership.

Why we exist

Our MSAR unit is positioned between the Inverloch SES and Port Welshpool Coast Guard. We cover the treacherous waters that rise between Shallow Inlet outflow and Waratah Bay. With the Surf Life Saving Club in the same estate, the best way to define our roles is any white water (waves, close to shore) in the Bay are covered by the Surf Club rescue boats, the blue water and Shallow Inlet inland waters are covered by our MSAR.

How to keep yourself safe when boating this year

A really important thing to remember for this year, is that both the Boat Hole launching site and the Heads have changed. The launching channel is not correctly marked now by buoys, so be careful and watch depths. The Heads have shifted significantly, so the best thing to do is put a trail on your GPS on the way out and follow that same trail on the way back in. There is now a bommie and the sand has shifted, causing the outbound and inbound tracks to not be straight. With that, stay safe, remember to carry your safety equipment and if you have any questions please feel free to ask either the Surf Club Patrolling members or Marine Search and Rescue.
