USO found on the beach at Sandy Point

With UFOs making the news recently we've had our own "close encounter" - a USO (Unidentified Sailing Object) Well not really; the strange thing that washed up on our beach recently wasn't that difficult to identify after all as it had plenty of markings enabling its origins to be quickly established. But it makes an interesting story nonetheless.

It appeared on our beach in early May halfway between the township and the entrance to the inlet, a little bit worse for wear. Several people lay claim to a first sighting but it was eventually recovered by a team from the Waratah Beach Marine Rescue Unit led by Greg Moulding.

It even made <u>national news</u> with Greg interviewed by the ABC. The story is intriguing. Our Saildrone, as we now know it, was packed with scientific instruments and launched from Bluff on the southern tip of New Zealand some 2 years ago. It's mission to study ocean currents, salinity levels and stock levels of krill, a vital food source in the southern ocean. Sadly, unlike its sisters, it went missing soon into the mission, thought lost until it turned up on our beach.

As we go to print we would like to bring the good news from Sandy Point Community Power that they have been successful in securing grant funding towards a community battery for installation at the Community Centre.

The first grant through our Federal Member Russell Broadbent's office is for \$16,848. The second has been secured through the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR) and is for \$9,800. Together they will allow SPCP to purchase and install a large battery storage system at the Community Centre. Update on current projects/issues

- Visit to Sandy Point: SGSC Chair Administrator, Julie Eisenbise, was in the process of planning a meeting with representatives from the various community groups of Sandy Point to gain first-hand knowledge of our achievements and aspirations. This has had to be postponed due to lockdown restrictions but has now been rescheduled for Tuesday 20th July. Community groups will be contacted to invite a representative from their group to attend when time is confirmed.
- Tourism/Economy Development Strategy: In response to Council's request for input into their Tourism and Economic Development Strategy we have sent a group submission. Peter Slifirski will continue to work with Rob McGauran, Michelle Jelliff and other relevant contacts to produce recommendations for a longer-term urban street-scape project.
- **Road Resurfacing:** An email was received from Paul Challis, SGSC Engineering Consultant, concluding that regular asphalt is proposed to be used for the critical areas of Beach Parade near the shops This decision was received with disappointment and dismay from the committee especially as we had met with Paul in January and discussed looking at alternative solutions rather than black asphalt. Paul advised that they had looked into producing a lighter mix but the contractor deemed it unviable due to costs associated for such a small amount. The committee have responded requesting further investigation in sourcing

a lighter stone.

• **Community Garden:** Our Project Coordinators, Doug and Liz Brown, have reported that: "there have been delays in obtaining the necessary equipment/parts for the wicking beds but we are hopeful that 2 wicking beds will be installed in the next few weeks and another 3 to come, hopefully soon after. Any interested and passionate gardeners are welcome to contact Liz on 0438 447667 or Amanda on 0490 690505 and they will fully inform you on the progress and what we are planning to plant in the garden."



• Waratah Way: Our Project Officer, Michelle Jelliff is in the process of investigating funding sources to determine if we can continue to pursue our dream of a shared trail from Ned Neales to Waratah Bay. <u>See page 6</u> for more information about this.

- Community Owned Renewable Energy Project: We congratulate the Sandy Point Community Power Inc for successfully gaining two grants which will enable battery storage at the Community Centre. See further details on this exciting project lower down this page.
- Sandy Point Signage Project: Looking forward to seeing the commencement of this project to enhance our township. The project is exciting and looks very impressive and is to my mind, long overdue. Sandy Point Community Power

Lots more to report on since the last edition of the newsletter was published.

You will recall that in the last edition we advertised for participants in a trial of our energy-trading scheme. We were extremely pleased to get over 30 applicants. Meanwhile, we are working with our partners in the venture to finalise contractual arrangements. We also await an understanding of the changes in regulated tariffs which are scheduled to be announced prior to July 1st. We are hoping for a launch by early August.

We have recently received the very good news that we have been successful in our applications for two grants. Firstly, a \$16, 848 grant through the "Stronger Communities Program" sponsored by our Federal Member, Russell Broadbent's Office. Secondly an amount of \$9,800 secured through the Foundation for



Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR). These grants will fund the installation of a smart inverter and battery storage at the Community Centre. In the short term this investment will provide greater resilience to power outages and will reduce the centre's power bill. In the longer term it forms a building block in our vision for a Virtual Power Plant (VPP) for Sandy Point. Solar generation from our residential, business and community buildings and substantial battery storage form key elements of our anticipated VPP. These together with generation from other aligned renewable sources will continue to strengthen our e-trading scheme.

The Waratah Way: an update

The Sandy Point Community Group (SPCG) has been campaigning for over ten years for a shared trail to be constructed along the inland side of the sand dunes, linking Sandy Point with the Waratah community. The trail is to be known as the Waratah Way. This page details the steps we have taken so far in our campaign and our future plans to progress this initiative.

In recent discussions with the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP), the SPCG has been advised that to progress this initiative, a number of elements need to be determined:

- Revise the trail concept to be limited to walkers and cyclists only
- Identify a route that is solely on Crown Land
- Liaise with DELWP, the Gunaikurnai Land and Water Aboriginal Corporation (GLaWAC) and Aboriginal Victoria to determine potential concerns relating to a cultural heritage assessment and management plan
- Liaise with DELWP regarding a feature and boundary survey
- Develop a project plan to guide actions in terms of intent of usage, preferred alignment and design, associated assessments, survey, proposed works (proposed route, extent of works, eg trail, boardwalks, bridges, site line clearance, etc), trail management once completed and the overall funding required.

SPCG will continue to liaise with the key stakeholders to address these elements and keep the community advised of the outcomes.

History of Sandy Point Ned Neal's Story

Despite the signmaker's confusion over the spelling of his surname, Ned Neil / Neale or Neal has been enshrined in Sandy Point history by the naming of the lookout near the junction of Beach Parade and The Boulevard in his 'honour'.

According to the story, Edward 'Ned' or 'Ted' Neil was a cattle 'duffer' (ie cattle thief) who stationed his mother on the high point of the dunes to make sure the 'coast was clear' for him to re-brand the cattle he had stolen. Vi Pilkington wrote in her history book *South of the Dividing Creek* "... the highest sand hill was always known as Neil's Lookout where Mrs Neil was stationed to watch with an eagle eye whilst Ted had a little job to



pull off." However, there is more to Edward Neil's story and perhaps he has been unfairly portrayed.

The following account is a summary of reports from various newspapers at the time and information from the Victorian Government Gazettes, Victorian Births Deaths and Marriages Registry and Ancestry.com.

The Gippsland Farmers' Journal reported that Edward Neil, a selector from Upper Agnes, was arrested on July 23rd, 1888, for stealing cattle from David Fraser (the licensee of the Sandy Point Run from 1867 until approximately 1888). The term 'selector' is at odds with Neil's notoriety as a cattle thief. A selector was someone who had been granted a licence or lease of Crown Land. Success in the 'selection' process required that the local Lands Board had satisfied itself that an applicant was of good character and capable of improving the land.

The Gazette contains records of an Edward Neil in the vicinity of Agnes being granted a licence, and later a lease for 187 acres in the parish of Toora.

Court and prison records state Neil was born in 1863 and was therefore 25 years old at the time of his arrest. There is only one possible record in the Victorian Births Deaths and Marriages Registry of an Edward Neil, born to Thomas and Ann (nee Bourke). The same source has a possible record for the death of a Thomas Neil in 1874 aged 49 years. If this is his father, young Edward would have been eleven years old when his father died. This accords with the evidence in the court records that Neil had looked after his mother. Like many, the Neil family possibly relocated from Ballarat to the Toora area to take advantage of new tracts of Crown Land that were being opened up for selection.

The trial and sentencing

The Police Gazette (7th Jan 1889) describes Neil as being 5'9 1/2" in height with sandy-coloured hair and blue eyes. He had a fresh complexion and was of stout build. He had a long thin nose, a scar on his forehead and a freckled face and arms.

The case was heard in Sale. Unusually, both the Crown Prosecutor and Fraser gave evidence in Neil's favour, describing him as being of good reputation and excellent character, always ready and willing to do all in his power to oblige. Fraser said he had known Edward Neil for fourteen or fifteen years and had been his employer for nearly all that time. He re-



counted how, since falling from a horse, Neil's conduct had become very different from what it used to be. The Crown Prosecutor also remarked that he had observed that a great change had come over the prisoner whom he had known favourably for years. It seems possible, Neil had sustained a permanent brain injury as a result of this fall, which left him with behavioural changes and a diminished ability to tell right from wrong.

The Defence informed the court that this was a first offence. He characterised Neil as having a strong desire to do humane acts to show himself as a charitable hearted young man supporting his mother by means of his small salary. He appealed to the court for leniency so that Neil could be restored to his work again so that he might regain the reputation he held prior to this unlawful act.

The Judge in addressing the prisoner said he found great difficulty in dealing with his case. He could not exercise the prerogative of mercy as it rested with the prisoner to petition for mitigation of his sentence on health grounds. He could only deal with the case as a first offender. Neil was sentenced to six months imprisonment with hard labour in the Sale gaol. The Victorian Police Gazette records that an Edward Neil, farmer, imprisoned for cattle stealing following his trial at Sale was released from Castlemaine Prison during the week of January 7th, 1889.

There are no further records of Neil or his mother and it can only be surmised what happened to them. David Fraser was soon to lose all his property in the economic 'crash' and the subsequent depression of the 1890s and may not have been in a position to offer assistance. With no social welfare or health system to fall back on, it is hard to imagine Neil as ever restoring himself to the position he was in prior to his accident.



Sandy Point Signage Project: Council's reply

As previously reported in the Autumn edition of this newsletter, a plan has been developed which has now been submitted to Council and they have replied with some positive comments.

The project has been divided into two sections.

Section 1: Welcome to Sandy Point sign

Council has approved that the existing town map sign may be moved.

Council requires a site visit and meeting with Rob Jenner (SGSC) to discuss an alternative footing for the "Welcome" sign on Telopea. They have concerns about road safety associated with having a 3m long x 0.5m deep x 0.6m high concrete

block (that forms the base of the proposed sign) sitting on the roadside. The plan provided doesn't show an offset from the edge of carriageway to the proposed structure.

The designer has been contacted and we are awaiting his response regarding an alternative option for the base of the sign before arranging a site visit to discuss this with Rob Jenner.

Section 2: Information Signs

Our proposal for information signage at the rear of the reserve, adjacent to the town toilet block is considered to be very good and is endorsed for action

Council however, is concerned that our requested location for the information signs to be placed right up against the fence does not provide the space required for mowing the lawn. Another concern is that we make sure we 'Dial before you Dig', that is, that we consult on the location of any underground cables before installing the signs. Further discussion is planned with Council to address their concern about mowing.

Waratah Marine Search and Rescue is recruiting!

What could your role be?

Are you interested in boating/fishing? Do you live/work in Sandy Point or within 30km, or are you a regular visitor on weekends and in holiday periods? Would you like to volunteer with our Marine Search and Rescue Service?



With the opening of our new base and potential for a larger offshore capable vessel in the near future, we need to increase our membership. There are roles for both active (boat crew) and non-active (trainer, admin, communications, fundraising) members, so you do not need to go to sea if that is not your thing. We now receive an annual grant to cover operational costs from the State Government through EMV, so the pressure to fund raise is reduced. Whilst prior boating experience is an advantage, not having this background is not a problem as all training is provided at no cost and we have several members with a great deal of experience who will mentor you and help you achieve the required qualifications.

As well as being tasked to incidents by the water police, we also act as a safety vessel for the annual Current Cruiser swim and assist Waratah Beach SLSC with training their members for search and rescue etc.

The minimum age for boat crew is 16 and we welcome members from all age groups. On-water training is generally conducted on Saturday mornings from 9:00am to midday. We have also just obtained a grant from Better Boating Victoria for audio visual equipment so we can conduct theory training at the base in the evenings or when the weather is inclement.

Waratah Marine Search and Rescue – June update 2021

As we move into winter we have been spoilt with some wonderful days. With restrictions in place and although very few have been able to take advantage of the light winds and smooth water, Waratah Marine Search and Rescue (MSAR) volunteers have remained on stand-by to keep a watchful eye.

On Monday 26th of April a strange orange vessel landed on our sandy shores. A Sail Drone that was set circumnavigate Antarctic waters was damaged by a collision with an iceberg and ended up spending a total of 718 days at sea. The vessel was first sighted coming towards shore early that morning, then later became grounded and photographed on the beach. The Waratah MSAR crew was mobilised and tasked with the job of finding and inspecting the object, finding the Sail Drone about 7km down the beach from the Surf Club. A commercial recovery of the vessel was undertaken and it is now awaiting return to California for evaluation and preparation for its next adventure.

In other news, around mid-June this year we are expecting a new tow vehicle to arrive, Leongatha Isuzu is providing a new D-MAX for towing the RHIB and our training vessels. We are thankful to the Victorian Government for the grant that funds this vehicle, as well as Leongatha Isuzu for sponsoring both MSAR and the Surf Life Saving Club. Along with the D-Max, we will also take possession of an Isuzu MU-X, so we will have the best of both worlds in a ute and a wagon.

Also, keep a look out for new signage at the Waratah Marine Search and Rescue base we share with the Men's Shed group.

Finally, as a volunteer organisation we must also keep up our qualifications and competencies. All MSAR crew are required to maintain a current first aid qualification, and as part of this CPR must be refreshed annually. This is a reminder that if you need to refresh your CPR or First Aid qualifications, please contact our training guru, Mike Devine, to enrol for a course.

Until next time, stay safe and warm through the winter months and remember to check in with someone before you head out on the water, and check in when you return. If anyone requires assistance on the water, or you see something dangerous, remember to call 000.











History of Sandy Point

A Pioneer Schoolteacher

Margaret Francis Coutts nee Ebbott b:1906 – d:1993

The school at Sandy Point was sent a new recruit by the Education Department in 1925, this coincidently was the final years of the Sandy Point school that was located in what is now the north central section of Ash Avenue. There are still some remaining large pine trees and a plaque signifying the school site erected by the community in recent times. Nearby at No 41 Ash Ave was a dam where children found time to get up to mischief.

Margaret was 19 years of age and it was her first teaching assignment.

She was to teach Keane Pilkington and others how to read & write and become a long time friend and correspondent to Vi Pilkington, right up until the final years of her life.

Vi Pilkington often visited us at our holiday home for a chat and a cup of tea and remembered Margaret as having a wise and pleasant nature.

She was a long time border at "ENNISVALE", the homestead that no longer exists, just north of the intersection of Sandy Point Road an Ennisvale Avenue, walking across the paddock toward the school each day for lessons.

Margaret was a distant cousin of mine and I spent time talking of those early days with her in her Alphington home where she spent her later years living alone. She did marry but had no offspring.

I recall her telling fondly about reaching Fish Creek from the City, and being met by horse and buggy and taken to Sandy Point and seeing ALL the Ferns and wildlife along the journey. What a first trip that must have been! She also enjoyed the musical evenings provided on a regular basis by the large assembly of Pilkingtons in the area

After the school was closed down in 1927 she returned to Melbourne and never again visited the area.

The effect of extreme tides at Shallow Inlet recently

Unfortunately, not all of you would have had the opportunity to explore the inlet recently but on these really still early winter days with the sun shining it's a spectacular place and a photographer's paradise.

Those who have been down there recently will also have noticed the effect of some unusually low and high tides.

For those boaties out there navigating the channel into the boat hole it would have been a real challenge!



Further down the inlet, there is evidence of possible breakthroughs from the ocean into the inlet well away from the current mouth.




Note: The sandspit at Shallow Inlet is constantly changing and people who've lived here or been coming here for many years will remember when there was very little vegetation on the dunes, which were as a result much flatter and the mouth of the inlet was not as far south as it is now. In fact, over the years it has moved considerably. At one stage the entrance to the ocean was from the boat hole. For more detail about this and some amazing aerial photos read Petrus C. Heyligers's 2006 research article "<u>Vegetation development on sand spit at</u> Shallow Inlet".



But for the birds using the sand and weed banks to forage it was a great opportunity.

Dark, damp patches of sand and weed show recent flows across from the ocean. With rising sea levels we can probably expect to see more evidence of this in the future.
