

## **Town Centre Plan**

With changing Victorian demographics our town centre will need to evolve to support/accommodate visitor numbers and demands. The Sandy Point Community Group would like to plan for tourism demand without destroying our township amenity, for example, acres of car parking in prime locations to satisfy peak loads.

We hope to work with and align with the Council's <u>Visitor Economy Strategy</u>, which will download from this link.

Currently we have a central town centre arrival point for shops, beach/surf club access, picnic area, toilets, parking, Community Centre and tennis courts. It has one adjacent super lot being the caravan park which helps with safety as it has only three entrances.

Principle discussion points for town centre brief could include:

- Public space needs to expand as do support facilities such as showers, toilets, lawn picnic areas
- Support town business viability
- Beach access and amenity at more than one point
- Investment in shared community facilities, clubs, lawns, showers, toilets, halls, parking, recreation
- Reinforce shared roadway system
- Preferred routes for through-vehicle traffic design to encourage drivers to use these routes.

#### Principle discussion points (continued)

- Preferred, safe routes for pedestrian flow different to vehicle flow route. Design to encourage pedestrians to use these routes.
- Clear beach access points aligned with pedestrian flow routes
- Clear access to commercial premises and community buildings.
- Designated, preferred areas for vehicle parking. Open to considering parking away from central area. Preference is not to have our precinct dominated by parking areas.
- · Recognition of bike riding flow & bike parking.
- Strong desire for more open space/parkland with direct pedestrian flow from exiting open space.
- Open access to recreational facilities eg. playground, BBQ's, tennis courts, community garden.
- Consideration of community events in design.
- Alignment of design with envisaged future community facilities eg. skate park, EV charger parking.
- · Access for emergency vehicles.
- Willing to consider methods to disperse crowds to other locations also suitable for desired activity eg. surfing to Manuka beach access point, fishing to Ned's access pointt



#### Next steps:

- Stakeholder engagement/common vision
- Council engagement and follow up with the leadership team at South Gippsland Shire Council
- · Continue briefing of ward councillors.

A sub-committee has been formed to progress this discussion and use the principles above to guide our thinking in relation to any work that emerges. We hope to be able to continue to engage with all of you as this initiative develops.

#### **Caravan Park Planning Application**

The caravan park has been a significant part of Sandy Point since its inception. The owner of the caravan park has applied to Council to subdivide the park for sale as individual housing lots. It is likely that the application will be advertised shortly.

Once the advertising period commences the process for responding is available to interested/affected parties.

#### What are some of the SPCG projects you have you worked on, and given you most satisfaction?

I soon took over updating Neil Shaw's new Sandy Point website and then created a new quarterly newsletter that involved contributions from all the groups and clubs operating in Sandy Point. As an editor I loved the challenge involved in getting contributions in time for me to meet my deadline!

I also helped out with Sandy Point's Koala Action Project, a 3 year project run by a group known as WHiSPA -

Wildlife and Habitat in Sandy Point Action Group - which was about protecting our native wildlife and improving their natural habitat in and around Sandy Point. We obtained a \$ 50.000 grant from the Victorian Government in 2017 to do this. A very rewarding project to be involved with.

# Battery storage for Sandy Point



We are very pleased to be able to report that the installation of the Community Centre battery system has resumed. With completion of repairs and bird proofing work on the Community Centre roof, the solar panels have been reinstalled and JohnoElec have completed the final tie-ins to the new battery system. The last step before the system can be turned on is the electrical inspection.

The completion of this step will mark a milestone achievement for Sandy Point. Our first communityowned battery will both reduce the Centre's power bill and provide a place which retains power during a black out. We thank the Percy Baxter Charitable Trust, administered by the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal, the Federal Government Stronger Communities Program, administered by our local member Russell Broadbent, and the South Gippsland Council, who each awarded us a grant for the community battery project. We received significant support from the Community Centre Committee of Management and Council Officers during the process to confirm approval for installation and thank the Sandy Point Men's Shed for building the battery enclosure. A great example of our community coming together as a team.

Looking into the future, our vision is for many more private and community-owned batteries networked together to form a Virtual Power Plant (VPP)

Consistent with this vision, Sandy Point was selected for a study examining the feasibility of a VPP as an example of an 'end-of-supply-line' coastal township. The study is being funded by LaTrobe Valley Authority and carried out by a consulting company called The Energy Project.

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Contact: 0417 031 045 johnoelec@bigpond.com We thank community members who allowed the study to use 30-minute electricity meter data from their property. The data has been used to evaluate the benefits of solar and battery systems on properties that are; permanently occupied, weekenders, and holiday-homes, respectively. Aggregated data from the Waratah/Sandy Point feeder line is being used to assess the feasibility of community-sized batteries. A preliminary study report is due for issue at the end of March. We plan to run a community meeting once the final report is available so that you all have an opportunity to understand the findings and to ask questions.

Sandy Point Community Power representatives recently met with Indigo Power to explore mutual opportunities. Indigo Power is a community-owned energy retailer based in Yackandandah and classified as a Social Enterprise. They have provided significant support to community-based renewable energy projects in the NE Victoria region and have pledged that 5C% of any profits made will be returned to communities. While having an impressive history of being awarded government grants and associated list of successful projects, they did stress that the retailing arm of their business was very tough road to travel. We heard their message and won't be hurrying down the same path.

You may have seen reports in the media about a program funded by the State Government and AusNet (the owner of the electrical poles and wires in the eastern half of the state) to protect bushfire-impacted communities with new fire resilient energy infrastructure to ensure people will have access to power even if a fire destroys electrical poles and wires. The program will see the creation of micro-grids comprising a mix of solar panels, batteries and other energy infrastructure for essential service buildings, commercial and industrial buildings, and households, to provide reliable power supply in all conditions. These projects are a breakthrough for our State as historically the main power supply line needed to be restored after a natural disaster before any power could be conducted along the poles and wires. While Sandy Point was not in the region considered for the program, the potential future opportunity for us is that Governments and AusNet will be able to assess the benefits delivered by these projects, and perhaps 'end-of-line' communities like ours will be next!

Publicly accessible Electric Vehicle (EV) chargers are coming to South Gippsland! Funded by a State Government program, EV chargers are to be installed at Foster, Korumburra, Leongatha, Loch, Meeniyan and Mirboo North. South Gippsland Council has put forward a request for further funding to expand the network of chargers around the Shire and have committed to consulting with us about the possibility of placing one at Sandy Point should their request be successful.

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# At the Shed

Quite a bit has happened at the Shed since we last reported. Early in January the builders finally managed to obtain the necessary materials to make a start on the internal fit out and despite a brief disruption due to a Covid scare have achieved significant progress.

The dividing wall separating the spaces used by Marine Rescue and us Shedders is in place keeping our dust from their boats. The meeting room and bathroom toilets are all framed up and the first fix plumbing and electrical works completed. The septic system should be installed as I write this article.

We have a slight pause as we assess our financial situation and decide the next priorities. These will be the internal plastering, final electrical and plumbing connections and fitting of appliances. We are already contemplating a date for an opening party!



Despite the delays in getting the shed finished, the group continues to flourish. We have 30+ registered, financial members. We meet regularly on a Monday morning at 9.00 am to work on Community projects, enjoy a cuppa and a chat; so why not drop in? And, once a month (second Wednesday at 7.30) the committee (plus support) meet to discuss the logistics of managing the group.

# Wildlife Welfare

On 29 January we had an adolescent male (150 kg – where mature is 280kg or so maximum) Australian fur seal come ashore. Over a 4 day duration he declined in health. The Marine Response Unit and Parks Victoria evacuated him from the beach but unfortunately he died whilst in the ambulance soon after transfer. His story was published in the March 2 2022 edition of The Mirror and reflects the profound effect he had on the community and the direction of WiSP



During the summer we had two possums taken from their dead mum's womb (struck by a car) and taken to Sue Moore's Tarwin Lower Wildlife Shelter for care. A possum was also attended to by a good citizen and reported on social media. WiSP responded to an old female koala being down and later she was euthanized due to poor condition and blindness. Four young seals were reported dead over the period.

# Wild activities

WiSP had a table at the the SPCG Foodies and Artisans Market to promote the Koala Survey and get donations including the raffle for the Koala Quilt made by Marg Grumley.

**The Koala Survey** was held from 8-15 January. There were 49 Koala observations of which 41 were counted in the survey. Through the process we feel confident that the population is stable. We have older koalas represented strongly in the last responses and want to know more about how we can support them.



Sandy Point's Wild Weekend, March 12 & 13
An information session was held on 12 March. The program included how to be prepared to assist a sick or injured animal. Our expert Jonathan Stevenson took us through what was needed and offered this contact list as part of preparation. # History of Sandy Point What's in a Name!

Have you ever wondered why Waratah Bay is named after a flower that's the state floral emblem of NSW? Well, actually, it's not! Not directly anyway. Local historian, Nicky Walker, explains how we came to be living and playing by a bay called Waratah.

The Waratah Bay area is part of the traditional lands of the Bunurong and Bratualong People. They lived, hunted and fished in the area for hundreds of years before displacement by European settlers.

Nicholas Baudin, a French naval officer initiated a scientific expedition from 1800-1803 to chart the coastline and record the native flora and fauna of New Holland (Australia) and Van Dieman's Land (Tasmania). His navigators named what is now Waratah Bay as Paterson Bay in honour of Lieutenant Paterson, a close friend of George Bass. (1)

However, in 1854 the 375 ton SS Waratah, whilst transporting passengers from Sydney to Melbourne, took refuge near what is now Walkerville. A crew member, J.B. Lamond said (2) that the Waratah had passed Gabo Island in a heavy storm and suffered damage to her rudder requiring the captain to take refuge in an 'unknown' bay. When repairs had been completed and the storm had abated, the Captain, William Bell observed that clay was pulled up with the anchor, indicating good holding ground. Captain Bell forwarded this to customs on arrival in Melbourne. The Bay was then named Waratah Bay.

A Notice to Mariners was later published in the Victorian Government Gazette (3) noting that 'Waratah Bay affords good anchorage and vessels may anchor in good holding ground at more than a mile offshore during south westerly gales'. The notice also describes the landmark 'Bell Point, a large broad topped rock about 40 feet high and about a cable [approx. 185 metres] from the shore'. Bell Point was named after the Captain of the Waratah.

The Waratah (1851-1867) was 380 gross ton, iron paddle steamer built by W Denny and Bros, Glasgow. Equiped with 140 horse power steam engine she transported passengers between Melbourne and Sydney. The Shipping Gazette and Sydney General Trade List reported in 1852 (4) that she looks 'by far the finest steam vessel in the colony'. This ship (launched 1852) should not be confused with another ship of the same name launched in 1908 which disappeared off the coast of Africa.

## Telopea Prive

Linked to the name of the ship is Telopea Drive in Sandy Point. *Telopia speciosissima* is the scientific name of the Waratah flower, a bright red flowering native plant and the state emblem of NSW.

The Foreshore Committee had a busy season with the large influx of tourists to Sandy Point and Shallow Inlet.

Our Rangers did a marvellous job clearing tracks together with ongoing Volunteer support which continues.

The Committee only obtains funding for the Rangers from Car Parking fees, which are approved by DELWP, and the Rangers are only employed during the Xmas period.

There is always a question about track clearing that arises every year and that is "Why do the cleared trees remain on site adjacent the tracks"? Well DELWP requires us not to remove any vegetation from the crown land we manage and whilst we would like to undertake mulching this is not practicable.

We must thank those volunteers who are also undertaking localised weed removal although we are actively seeking funding through grants to undertake large area eradication.

Speaking about grants, we have been fortunate to be awarded a grant totaling \$42,000 to construct an erosion control fence along the toe of the dunes on the eastern side of the main beach track going along to the ramp that provides access for the Life Saving Club vehicle. The fence is the same as that located right next to the main beach access, which has been proven very successful.



Additional fencing will be located along the main beach path and ramp area to restrict access to the dunes in this area which are eroding quickly due to wind erosion. This will allow revegetation to be undertaken on the dunes which also forms part of the grant monies. The works will be undertaken during spring.

For now we would hope everyone has a good Easter and remind everyone that the restriction on dogs is not lifted until end of April. So please respect our no dog limitations and think of others before you go to the beach with your dog/s.

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As the peak holiday maker boating season draws to a close, we look back on a successful season despite covid related disruptions. There is no doubt that being in and out of lockdowns, unwell and isolating crew members and state mandated protocols all created difficulties getting up hours of training this season, but despite this skippers and crews took every opportunity to upskill and deliver an optimal service.

Over the summer we had a number of call outs and happily none of these involved serious injury. We located a missing kayaker off the prom near the Glennies in very strong winds, towed back a fishing boat from Norman Island whose motor had caught fire on an overnight trip, recovered a jet ski in the inlet and dragged out a sunken boat from the inlet that had caught fire. Waratah Marine Rescue also provided valuable support to the Waratah Beach Surf Life Saving Club by patrolling the course and keeping recreational craft in the inlet away from swimmers. On Good Friday the Walkerville Walrus swimming group will do their annual Walkerville to Waratah swim and we will be keeping close to provide any assistance if required.

Training this season included many hours developing navigation and boat handling skills in a wide range of conditions that included bar crossings, strong winds, poor visibility, night-time and beach launching inside Shallow Inlet, around the islands of Wilsons Promontory and along Waratah Bay. Always an enjoyable and valuable experience is working in with Surf Club members so both groups build awareness of each other's skills capabilities, and how we can work together for training exercises and in potential emergencies.

A few of us also took part in EMV coordinated radio operation and crew skill courses and multi agency simulated search and rescue exercise in Corner Inlet.

And with a shortage of trainers before Christmas, LSV kindly arranged a First Aid course for us so we could remain operational in readiness for the season ahead (all crew must have up to date First Aid qualifications, Victorian boat license, Working with Children Certificate and be a paid up member of WBSLSC).

From our annual EMV grant plus a couple of business and community donations plus support from LSV we have renovated the rescue base (along with the Men's Shed), installed a new state of the art navigation system and new motors, received a new ute (yet to be branded) and our expert boat repairer and valued skipper, Doug Taylor, is getting close to completing 'Sinkalot', a purpose built vessel that allows recovery training on a simulated sunken ship that can fill with water and be purged as required.

This season we signed up 3 very committed and experienced trainee crew members, Mike Jamieson, Andrew Makowski and Rhys Williams who have put in a heap of time to gain familiarity with the service and quickly become valued members of the team. If anyone, permanent or non-permanent resident, would like to join our Waratah Marine Rescue then please do not hesitate to reach out to myself or any of the group. We will remain active over the colder months and our 24-7 Marine Rescue Service will be skilled and ready to assist as required.

Another highlight was the talk from Matt Momenturo from the Marine Mammal Foundation who introduced the Nippers to our marine environment and how to look after it.

Every year I am in awe of how early nerves at the beginning of the program turn into the confidence we see at the Club Championships, in such a short time – our program was just 8 sessions this year (we lost a session to the extreme weather) and most Nippers do not complete all the sessions. So to see the outstanding development of our Nippers in such a short time is a real credit to our Age Managers and Water Safety Team.

#### **Age Managers**

Our Age Managers brought a special combination of leadership, enthusiasm and friendly organisation skills and it is that combination that ensures the success of our program and the special vibe that we all feel. They do a lot of preparation in the background, arrive early to setup and sign all the Nippers in and have 'stepped-up' over the past two years to lead the sessions because of our COVID-safe 'on the beach' format. They make sure our program runs so seamlessly and they play an enormous role in building the leadership and confidence of our Water Safety team.

## That's a wrap – nearly! Our 2021/22 season is drawing to a close on Anzac Day, but we have had a fantastic season despite a few hiccups.

It was such a shame she did not see our club bursting with the usual chaotic energy of water safety getting organised, nippers and their parents trudging down to the beach and the bronze camp training all at once. On a positive note, it was great to show Cath the challenges we face as our facility continues to age under the harsh coastal conditions and explain the need to expand our members' training areas and sleeping arrangements due to the growth and demand to hire our facility.

The Current Cruiser swim was held on 1st Jan and although that date initially looked risky, being New Year's Day, it was a blessing in disguise as it had minimal impact from the wave of covid that was about to hit the community. Paul Minahan had done a huge amount of work during the year to organise this event and it was such a shame that he could not attend on the day due to being infected by covid-19



We had 142 competitors who all had a tremendous day and enjoyed the cooler waters on what was a fairly hot day. The current cruiser is our biggest single fundraising event raising around \$17k. Thanks to Max for being race adjudicator on the day and all the help with raising sponsorship.

The following week was very quiet both around the club and in the township. It appeared that covid-19 had caused local hibernation and limiting social contact was on everyone's minds and the change in weather had also scared off campers.

As covid-19 infections began to rise, the decision to cancel the Development camp was made. LSV were concerned that lifeguards and key personnel required as leaders on the camp would be considered household contacts and then required to isolate for 7 days if a case was to arise. Having lost 50% of local lifeguards to covid, there was a concern that there would not be enough guards to patrol during the season.



Once covid-19 settled down and the club returned to normal activities, we were once again the first choice for many to enjoy an evening drink and nibbles whilst watching the sunset over Cape Liptrap. Our first spit roast dinner event was touch and go for a while. 24 hours out and only 30/70 booking secured, however, by noon the event was a sell-out.

The food was delicious and plentiful. Word must have travelled about the quality and quantity of food as the next event sold out within days after the first. The caterers did mention that they 'have never seen a group eat so much food '. The same caterers have been booked for next January and we will host a spit roast on each Wednesday and Friday from Boxing Day to Australia Day (8 events).



Covid-19 had an impact on almost everything we did this season. A local singer, Fiona Curram was booked to perform 4 shows, but could only make 2 due to being positive with covid-19. Both events were a hit, and once again it was standing room only. Fiona has a powerful voice and we enjoyed having her play at our venue. We look forward to many more music and social nights over Easter.

Well done to Keegan Clarke and the active members for navigating their way through another season of uncertainty. I thought last summer was sure to be the last that had covid-19 restrictions, but I was clearly mistaken. I believe this summer was worse with several members testing positive during the season, resulting in training and camps being cancelled and the Jan bronze camp being shut down midway through the course. The challenges were noticeable and I'm proud of the integrity and effort applied to each situation. Well done for keeping our beach safe and not missing any required patrols.



On the 22nd Jan we held the Waratah Beach club championships, including the Dell board paddle and the Cope ski Paddle. There was a good sized group on the day and for a change the weather was on our side. Well done to everyone who participated this year, and I hope to see a larger crowd next year.

I can't recall how many times people from the community praised the work that had been done around the club and in the social room. As a result of this, many people have signed up as new members or re-joined. Having the social room open again and looking world class was certainly a proud moment.
