I was intrigued by the Dune Fence article as I have been coming to Sandy Point since the late 1950's and I cannot recall the fence debacle, but do remember the fun we had as kids running up the steep sand dunes and rolling down! However, I must admit, I was one of the very few that slept through the earthquake – the earth did not move for me!

Our summer activities of the Sandcastle Competition and Sausage Sizzle were both successful events with providing community engagement, entertainment and the necessary boost to our funds! As many of our readers will know, on Thursday 8 February the residents of Sandy Point were shaken awake at just before 1am by an earthquake. It was a magnitude 4.3, with the epicentre near Meeniyan and was a lot more noticeable than the 3.1 earthquake that was experienced near Foster just two days before. That one it seems was not strong enough to be felt by many people in Sandy Point.

Apparently, on average, 100 earthquakes of magnitude 3 or more are recorded in Australia each year. Earthquakes above magnitude 5.0, such as the destructive 1989 Newcastle earthquake, however only occur on average every one-to-two years.

Fortunately for us, our recent quake did not seem to do any real damage to property in Sandy Point, apart from a few items falling off shelves. Nearly everyone said they were shaken awake by it and many heard a rumbling noise one resident likened to a freight train coming past. Most residents reported that their windows rattled loudly and one or two people said it affected their power for a very short time. The whole experience fortunately only lasted for about 15 seconds.

My own experience of the quake was similar. We were woken by the noise as the whole house started heaving and creaking and the glass shower screen door in the bathroom started vibrating very loudly.

We had experienced a quake like this a few years ago during the day time and on that occasion we ran outside onto the road in case the house fell down on us. (It didn't!) Fortunately this time the quake stopped quite quickly and we realised we didn't need to go outside. No damage was done to our house and the shower screen door is still intact!

Then, as most of you will remember, about two weeks later a wild storm hit Victoria causing severe damage to houses and vegetation and prolonged power outages in many areas. Fortunately again we missed the worst of it, with reportedly little damage being done and our power only going off for a few hours.



So, it seems, this is just another thing we can look forward to when living in Sandy Point – though its wild winds and stormy seas are seen as a plus by many of our resident and visiting surfers and wave sailors!

.. AND THEN THERE WAS ONE!

Can we help this last SP chick to survive?



Five Hoodie chicks had hatched on the SP spit at the end of February - only one survives! Recreational beach-users who share the Hoodies' home can take steps outlined below to help this chick survive past Easter when it will be old enough to fly from danger.

Hooded Plover parents send their flightless chick in to hiding when a threat approaches (including people on foot, bike or horse) so it cannot forage and stays motionless till the threat is gone. The chick feeds itself, ranging from waters-edge to debris and weed at the top of the beach.

The chick's parents are constantly vigilant to protect against natural predators such as ravens, magpies and gulls, our presence distracts from this

This little family forages 1.5 km along the ocean beach from Designated track towards Wilson's Prom, and past the rope-fenced nest area across the spit to Shallow Inlet.

Please heed BLA signs, don't linger, stick to water's edge and always leash your dogs.



The AGM of the Sandy Point Community Men's Shed (Inc) was held on Wednesday the 13 March 2024, at the Community Centre. All positions were filled and it was encouraging see the willingness of shed members to take on the various roles.

2023 was a challenging year for the group, due to the complications with obtaining a Certificate of Occupancy (CoO) from the Building surveyor. This has left the group in the position of only being permitted to carry out an internal fit out of our portion of the shared facility and not involve group members in the normal "Men's Shed" like activities. I am grateful to the members who turn up (religiously) on Mondays and Wednesdays to carry out this work.

The stumbling block has been the requirement to install fire retardant material in two of the walls of the shared facility, which was not a part of the original CoO application. This documentation is being completed now and hopefully, will satisfy the Surveyor's requirements. The "shedders" will be undertaking the actual work involved to install the fire retardant material for the shared facility. I am grateful to Ray Henderson and Chris Cope (WBSLSC) for their work in regard to this.

Our membership is currently 23 financial and 53 non financial members but I believe we will have more people show a willingness to be involved once the Shed is accessible and open for activities.

Our community involvement over the year included assistance at the annual Easter Art Show (ongoing in 2024), installation of park benches/tables along the Roy Henderson Track, the SPCG sausage sizzle/sandcastle competition and the Foodies Festival. We are involved in the eBus project currently underway in Sandy Point and have charging points installed adjacent to our premises.

I will leave comments on these matters to the committee members of these initiatives

The completion of the shared MSAR/Men's Shed has been compared to the construction of the pyramids, in terms of the time taken but I am hopeful 2024 will be "the year of the shed."

So, with all parties ie. Department of Transport and Planning (DTP), iMOVE, La Trobe University, Venus Bay Community Centre and SPBMC all in agreement, the hard work was done (in 7 days) to get the official launch at the congress.

The speeches in front of a great audience were terrific and very supportive of the efforts to bring community transport to the townships of Sandy Point and Venus Bay. The ribbon was finally cut by the DTP Executive Director - Gippsland, Beth Liley.

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
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Sandy Point Music (SPM) ...



The Centre's bookings continue to ensure that the Centre is fully used during the summer holidays and summer months. We have hosted Kidz Klub, yoga, pilates, Bass Coast Leadership Development Camp and a number of weddings, as well as the most successful Sandy Point Music nights. The Foodies Market once again was a great success and we congratulate the Sandy Point Community Group for hosting and organising this event. It is certainly a popular event on the Summer calendar.

Over the summer months the tennis courts were fully utilized and as such we collected over \$1500 membership and hire fees along with the regular table tennis participants' fees. We will endeavour to continue to maintain the tennis courts for community use.

We have received letters of concern from some community members and also the Community Group's President on behalf of that committee on the matter of the lack of fencing near the playground. The committee has contacted the Council on a number of occasions in relation to the lack of adequate fencing and are awaiting a response from Council before any further action can be taken.

Whilst the Community Centre remains a popular meeting spot, we have unfortunately been the victim of some vandalism, namely the septic system. The Centre is not just a Council asset but an asset to all the community, so if you are passing by and see some misbehaviour, please contact one of the Committee to follow up. The council has limited funds and repairs are mostly listed for the following financial year rather than immediately attended to.

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EASTER ART SHOW

Champagne corks will be popping this Easter to celebrate the coming of age of the Sandy Point Art Show.



The 21st Art Show will be officially opened at the Sandy Point Community Centre on Friday 29 March and will be open to the public from Saturday, 30 March until Monday, 1 April from 10am to 4pm.

The brain child of Sandy Point identities Marj and Don Head, who even camped outside the hall to act as security guards, the inaugural show opened its doors in the original T.P. Taylor Hall at Easter 2003. Since then the much loved Art Show has attracted artists' contributions from all over South Gippsland and beyond with more than 3,000 artworks showcased during the past 20 years.

The Art Show now offers prizes in many categories. Works in Oil, Acrylic, Watercolour, Mixed Media, Photography Drawing - Pastel, Pencil & Ink, Sculpture -3D including Ceramics and Mosaics are invited. There is also a Junior Artists' section and prize money for Best In Show (\$500) and the Joyce Crawford People's Choice award (\$350). Winning entries are decided by an independent panel of qualified judges. All sponsorship contributions are allocated as prize money with \$3700 awarded in 2023.

The Art Show has been held despite many challenges, including moving to the new Community Centre, many Easters where the weather was more than inclement and even the Covid pandemic.

Funds raised by the Art Show stay in the Sandy Point community and have contributed towards several upgrades of Hall facilities, as well as assisting the promotion of other local events. As with most community based events, the Sandy Point Art Show is dependant upon the generosity of loyal sponsors, the goodwill and interest of local residents and visitors alike and a dedicated group of volunteers. And also like most community events, there is always a need for volunteers who will give up some of their time each year to ensure the smooth running of the show. Volunteers are always welcome to assist with the myriad of tasks ranging from promotion and communication assistance to Community Centre set up and hanging of the art works.

ANIMAL WELFARE

This quarter saw a large volume of responses.

Five ring tail possum joeys were responded to. Concern that the joeys were being abandoned due to poor food supply was raised but not confirmed by experts.

Two little penguins were responded to. Both were transported to Phillip Island Nature Park (PINP) for care however the second was taken to Sue Moore for care before being taken to PINP and survived. It will be released at Phillip Island.

A koala was also responded to and is in care and the previous koala unfortunately died after being treated for mange and looking towards rehabilitation and release. It's believed he was elderly.

Two dead wombats (car strike) were attended and one had a joey that did not survive.

Multiple seals were reported and the Melbourne Zoo Marine Response Unit attended one with a bad eye that had been previously reported. It unfortunately died during the rescue.

A blue tongue lizard and cormorant were also transported to the veterinary and unfortunately had to be euthanised or died on the way.

Four wombats were treated for mange during this time. There are at least three mangy wombats in the area that are being sought for treatment.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

On January 6th WiSP had a food stall and raffle at the SPCG Foodies and Artisans Market. The WiSP volunteers sold out of 200 BBQ pulled pork and brisket rolls in just 90 mins. The Marg Grumley Baby Animals Quilt raffle generated \$762 that went directly to our two primary wildlife carers, Sue Moore and Jenny Bryant. Over \$2000 was raised. Thank you so much Sandy Point community and visitors.

On 13 January WiSP held an 'Everything Koalas' event that included a children's activity session and presentation and a koala discussion with our special presenter, Sue Moore. During the day WiSP had a Habitat display with desirable and undesirable plants, and gave a presentation about WiSP and the CoastCare Victoria funded Coast Banksia Woodland Project.







EVERYTHING **KOALAS**



Sue provided a talk on her work at Bass Coast Wildlife Rescue and Shelter. She talked about the different diseases koalas are subjected to, including mange and chlamydia, and stated that chlamydia symptoms present themselves when koalas are compromised. Luckily Sandy Point has only had two cases of chlamydia reported since 2015. Sue took questions and gave us advice on how we can best manage the small but important koala population we have in Sandy Point and the Reserve.

The day ended with the 2023/24 Sandy Point Koala Survey Results. Participation was large again with 71 sightings reported. 26 individual koalas were counted in the first two days and included a short duration count in the Shallow Inlet Reserve for the first time (six counted here). One injured koala (mum with a joey) was reported but no intervention was required. Nine mum and joey pairs were reported (maybe six individual pairs) and at least three different young koalas (based on locations) were observed. The population is at least replacing itself with young. A broad estimate is 35-45 individuals.

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COAST BANKSIA WOODLAND PROJECT

After a wet Summer and now a much drier Autumn we can see some changes within the project site at Shallow Inlet. Our project area is very different to when we started in July 2023

Take a look at these three photos of the Periwinkle weed *Vinca Major* along the track side, Roy Henderson Trail.

Rob O'Sullivan completed the contractor Spring weed spraying (Grant funding) along the sides of the Roy Henderson trail in November. He will complete another Autumn spraying in April. We hope to be planting indigenous grasses as tube stock as well as trees (sheoaks, banksias) in April 2024. We have sourced corflute tree guards for the grasses and will be looking for help with the building of chicken-wire tree guards that will be required for the sheoaks and banksias.

KOALA HABITAT - Manna Gum Plantation Maintenance

In the Manna Gum Plantation to the north of the Sandy Point Road, there are many trees planted a number of years ago. Some of the larger trees had guards removed as they were deemed ready to be browsed by any koalas that frequented the area. Unfortunately the trees must have been extra tasty as they had been over-eaten by the koalas.

So one hot morning, 12 WiSP volunteers recently replaced some guards and mended others. The rotted stakes were replaced with new ones sourced from Meeniyan for a reasonable price. The stakes were paid for by money raised by WiSP volunteers at various functions.

This plantation can be reached via the recently slashed track that runs off the Roy Henderson trail to the north. Thank you labourers and money raisers, and the Foreshore Committee for clearing the track which enabled vehicular access.

SALT MARSH - Walk and Talk

In January WiSP, in conjunction with CoastCare's Summer by the Sea program, conducted a Walk and Talk session at the inlet. During this session, the importance of salt marshes was discussed as well as changes made to the Shallow Inlet salt marsh by shifting channels and shifting sand dunes. Also mentioned was the interface between the salt marsh and the adjacent farming land.

During the walk many of the salt marsh plants were in flower which made identification, using the supplied ID brochures, easier. This brochure, and 2 others, can be downloaded from the SPCG website.

Further to the article about the "Big Dune" in the last issue, some long term residents/visitors to Sandy Point may remember the sand dune fence.

THE BIG DUNE FENCE FIASCO

Prior to the dune being planted with marram grass, the Foreshore Committee of the time, around early 1970s, came to the (wrong) conclusion that the vehicle activity on the dune was the cause of the major sand drift that was rapidly moving North. Their solution was to erect a fence across the front of the dune and continuing around the corner to the South.

One of the Committee members worked for the old Country Roads Board and managed to source a supply of second hand "white posts" that were used to mark roadsides, and also a quantity of heavy duty steel cable. This took a huge amount of work, as the posts were the old 5 inch square redgum, and each one had to be drilled with holes to thread the steel cable through.

There were a few unforeseen consequences of the fence, the main one was losing the ability to park vehicles and boat trailers high enough up the beach to remain out of the water during high tides, as seen in the photos. As most of us expected, the fence had no effect on the stability of the dunes, and after a couple of years it was completely covered in sand and disappeared.

About 15 years later, after the dune was stabilised with marram grass and began to recede to the South, the fence reappeared looking a bit the worse for wear. The steel cable was rusting and broken in places and a real danger to children playing on the dune. It took a considerable amount of work to remove over a period of time, as the dune did not recede evenly.

The moral of this story - always seek professional advice.

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State Government Announces First Round of '100 Neighbourhood Batteries Program'

The recipients of funds for the first round of the Victorian Government's \$42M 'Neighbourhood Battery' project program have just been announced. In this round 25 batteries will be installed across the state with Mondo, the commercial arm of our distribution network owner AusNet, awarded \$5.2M to install 21 of these batteries on the network. Seven of these will be installed on Philip Island where the electricity supply system is very close to full capacity during the evening peak. Four batteries will be located in Queenscliff. Mondo will also install ten smaller pole-mounted batteries in other locations across the state. Smaller 'behind-the-meter' batteries will be installed at sporting facilities and community buildings by other organisations in Wodonga, Yackandandah, Tatura and Wangaratta.

The aim of the program is to use the batteries to soak up excess rooftop solar that is fed into the grid during the day, then discharge the power during the evening peak. Communities benefit as more solar can be feed into the grid than would otherwise be the case. Mondo have also pledged to make contributions to local community projects in conjunction with their projects.

Update on AusNet 2026-31 price reset & work plans

You may recall that we have a Sandy Point representative on the AusNet 2026-2031 Electrical Distribution Price Review process. This is a process that each electricity and gas distribution company must complete every five years. The outcome is a proposal detailing a works plan with associated costs covering this 5-year period.

In establishing their workplan, AusNet has to make estimates of electricity demand which will change between now and 2031. There are some key factors driving change including; population growth and the number of new connections, the rate of transition from home gas appliances to electric and the number of 'all-electric' new home that will be built, the rate of installation of new solar panels and batteries, and the rate of uptake of electric vehicles. Ausnet have sourced data and forecasts from recognised organisations to make these estimates.

It is expected that most of capital works to expand the capacity of the electricity network will be located in the new suburbs to the north and east of Melbourne. There will also be a program to replace ageing network assets such as old wooden poles which have reached the end of their operating life. AusNet are also developing plans to improve the reliability of supply to the 'worst-served-customer' and the resilience of the grid against major climatic events.

There is much work still to be done on the plan before it is submitted to the Australian Energy Regulator (AER) for thorough review and approval. The regulators job is to represent us by ensuring that all costs are both 'prudent' ie. required, and 'cost-efficient' ie. that the best solution option has been selected and that the benefit to customers outweighs the cost.

Both AusNet and the AER are very alert to the cost-ofliving pressures that some customers are experiencing. Together, they have a shared responsibility to deliver a work plan that balances the competing needs to set the electricity network up to allow us to meet our renewable energy targets, while constraining cost increases to customers.

Attendance at Community Energy Conference

A Community Energy Congress was held recently at Darling Harbour in Sydney. To save people travelling to Sydney, a number of virtual regional 'hubs' were established where community members could listen to and ask questions of the speakers. One of these hubs was set up in the SGSC meeting room in Leongatha.

A highlight of the congress was the presentation from Saul Griffiths who you may have seen in the media. He is championing the 'Electrify Everything' campaign. His proposition is that we need to transition all power generation away from coal and gas to renewable sources as soon as possible, and switch from gas appliances to electric. Saul is a compelling speaker and presented irrefutable evidence for action on renewable energy in a thoroughly digestible and entertaining manner.

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




